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## 2009 VOTE RECORD

In advance of the 2009 legislative session, Washington Farm Bureau sent lawmakers our annual [Public Policy Agenda](#) listing four priority issue areas for this year:

- 1) Encourage water conservation by repealing or significantly modifying statutory relinquishment of water rights.
- 2) Promote a sustainable agricultural labor supply by enacting an essential worker program for agriculture.
- 3) Foster sound environmental outcomes by encouraging voluntary stewardship and creating market opportunities that recognize environmental benefits provided by agriculture.
- 4) Promote a sound economy by reducing the fiscal and regulatory burden faced by farmers and ranchers.

This vote record attempts to measure the success made in each of those areas and to inform Farm Bureau members of how their legislators voted on the issues most important to our state's farm and ranch families.

It must be noted that many bills of importance to Washington agriculture never made it to the floor of the House or Senate for a vote. In many cases, the Legislature avoided controversial issues. In other cases, your Farm Bureau lobby team was successful in defeating harmful legislation at the committee level. And, in some instances, legislation Farm Bureau supported did not advance from committee.

### Here is a brief summary of the bills in the vote record:

**HB 1402 (Ex parte contact)** is a measure impacting the workers' compensation program in Washington. It will prohibit a party from contacting a medical provider after an appeal has been filed, with certain exceptions and conditions. It is devastating for employers who are generally not involved in the appeal process yet seek to manage claims, as they are now unable to obtain information from medical providers. The legitimate concerns of employers were never addressed, and therefore Farm Bureau asked legislators to vote NO. It passed the Senate 29-18-0-2 and the House 56-41-0-1.

**HB 1571 (Water right adjudications)** is designed to update the water right adjudication program to provide a more streamlined process and thus hopefully a process of much shorter duration than the Yakima Basin adjudication. While Farm Bureau did not take a position on this measure, we vigorously supported an amendment that would have clarified that a completed adjudication would remain an "active" case in the superior court of the county in which the case

was filed. While the House declined to vote on this provision, the Senate did vote on amendment 355 sponsored by Senator Jim Honeyford at the request of Farm Bureau. The amendment failed by a vote of 20-28-0-1.

**HB 1733 (Equine eligibility for open space; removal of some penalties)** ensures that commercial equine (horse) operations remain eligible for the Open Space Tax Program and also ensures that any type of operation that becomes ineligible, or is removed, through no fault of the owner, will not face penalties, back taxes, and interest. The final version of the bill passed the House 95-0-0-2 and the Senate 47-0-0-2. Farm Bureau supported this measure.

**HB 1815 (Long term crop eligibility for open space program)** clarifies that crops requiring a multi-year delay before first harvest - such as grapes, fruit trees, cranberries, Christmas trees, asparagus and others - will be considered eligible for the Open Space Tax Program during those years between planting and first harvest. The provision applies to operations larger than 5 acres. Any operation greater than 20 acres was already exempt from minimum revenue requirements. The final bill, supported by Farm Bureau, passed the House 93-0-0-5 and the Senate 48-0-0-1.

**SB 5560 (Agency climate leadership)** provides direction to agencies in preparing for perceived issues related to climate change. Farm Bureau did not support the underlying bill, but actively opposed the measure when amendment 623 was offered by Representative Hans Dunshee. This amendment requires all state agencies, beginning in 2010, to consider when distributing capital funds whether the entity receiving the funds has adopted policies to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Agencies also must consider whether the project is consistent with: the state's limits on the emissions of greenhouse gas; statewide goals to reduce annual per capita vehicle miles traveled by 2050; and applicable federal emissions reduction requirements. We opposed the amendment, which was adopted by a vote of 53-44-0-1. The measure then passed the House by a vote of 60-37-0-1 and the Senate with a vote of 28-19-0-2. Farm Bureau opposed both final passage votes.

**SB 5850 (Human Trafficking)** primarily focuses on providing training for medical doctors to recognize the symptoms of human trafficking, but the bill also contained a provision that would require employers to create and provide a 'human trafficking disclosure form' for any worker who is not a U.S. citizen but came to Washington based on an offer of employment. Failure to provide the disclosure would be a violation of the consumer protection act (triple damages and attorney fees). Farm Bureau did not oppose the bill in the Senate as we were working with the sponsor, but we were unable to get the concessions required for our support, and therefore we asked for a NO vote in the House. The bill passed the House 50-48. Ultimately, the governor vetoed the consumer protection act enforcement provision, as requested by Farm Bureau.

**SB 5945 (Expanding government health care programs)** as originally introduced, would have imposed a nearly \$25 billion payroll tax to provide universal health insurance for Washington residents. As amended, the bill significantly expands the state Medicaid program in order to access \$1.8 billion in temporary federal stimulus dollars. Unfortunately, the state will be committed to future appropriations even after these federal funds disappear. The bill also directs that the state align its health care activities so it will be "poised to participate in federal health care reform," including demonstration efforts. The final version of the bill was adopted by the House 62-35-0-1 and by the Senate 28-19-0-2. Governor Gregoire vetoed a provision supported by Farm Bureau and its coalition partners that would have ensured small employers a voice in this process.

**SB 5963 (Unemployment insurance conformity)** was designed to address a recent federal government determination that Washington's unemployment insurance (UI) system did not conform to federal law, thus necessitating structural changes. The business community negotiated a solution and defended it against attempts by labor unions to dramatically increase costs to our system, which already provides some of the best benefits in the nation. The bill passed the Senate in the form we supported by a vote of 38-11. We opposed amendments in the House that would have increased system costs, and asked for a NO vote in the House. The House passed the amended bill 50-47-0-1. We asked the Senate to remove the House amendments, which they did. The final version of the bill, which Farm Bureau supported, passed the Senate 46-0-0-3 and the House 71-25-0-2.

**SB 6019 (Small business wellness programs)** allows health insurance carriers to work with small employers to develop and implement programs that directly improve employee wellness. Participating employers that properly document program activities may request a reduction in health insurance premiums based on three years' experience. Carriers may allow a premium discount of up to 20 percent for successful wellness program results. The final version of the bill passed the Senate 45-0-1-3 and the House 98-0. Farm Bureau supported this measure.

**SB 6035 (Get retro)** was a politically motivated attack aimed to cripple the retrospective rating program used by Farm Bureau members. The retro program is the most successful public/private partnership in our workers' compensation system. Employers who participate in the program have safer work places and therefore pay lower workers' compensation premiums than employers who do not participate. We asked for a NO vote in the Senate, but it passed 25-24. The bill was not brought to the House floor for a vote.

**SB 6109 (Renewable fuel standard for state ferries)** was originally designed to address a number of issues related to the operation of the state ferry system. The measure passed by the Senate Transportation Committee included a provision exempting the ferry system from the renewable fuel standards adopted in 2007. These standards require all state agencies to use a fuel blend with at least 2 percent biodiesel and beginning in June 2009, at least 20 percent biodiesel. The biodiesel industry has been built around known demand created by public policy such as this mandate. Elimination of this policy sends the message that we all should "do as the state says, not as we do." Senator Jerome Delvin offered amendment 334 to retain the current renewable fuel policy. The amendment passed 26-21-0-2 and the bill died as it no longer met the goal of the sponsors. Farm Bureau supported the Delvin amendment.
